


# Great Day! Scheduled Tour Summary

## THE JURASSIC PERIOD TO EUCLID BEACH PARK TUES JUNE 6, 2017

Departures, as applicable, from Westlake, Elyria, North Olmsted, Middleburg Heights, Independence, Beachwood.

For 140 million years, giant dinosaurs ruled the planet, many of them feeding on the plants that thrived in Northeastern Ohio and other parts of the world. A number of these creatures were the largest animals to walk on land in the past. On this unique tour that includes the Museum of Natural History, we will see “Jane”, a “juvenile Tyrannosaurus rex or an adult pygmy Tyrannosaurus”, as no one is quite sure. We also included a rare and valuable



American treasure, “Audubon’s Birds of America”, opportunities to see Balto, the hero dog of Alaska, a pendulum that demonstrates the earth’s rotation, moon rocks and other fascinating displays including “Lucy”, a 3.2 million-year-old human ancestor. Specific inclusions for 2017 have not been finalized by the museum as of the date of publication and may change.

During another visit during the day, you will be discovering how crucial a hub of development that Cleveland was in the transportation industry. This history will be brought alive as we see some of the locally, and non-locally, built antique automobiles, motorcycles, boats, bicycles, aircraft carriages and even sleighs. So many innovations and “automotive firsts” began in this area and, during the period from the late 1800’s until the Depression, over 80 makes of cars were built in Cleveland. The first car manufactured in the city was by a Scottish immigrant, Alexander Winton, who started out building bicycles and transitioning over to automobiles. One of his factories was on Berea Road near Madison Avenue. Eventually our city lost out to Detroit for the “number one trophy” but remained “number two” for a number of years. Did you know that the White Sewing Machine Company eventually transitioned into building large trucks and buses?



Since we are “in the area”, we will be dining in Little Italy at one of the oldest restaurants in that area. It’s traditional and delightful.

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All tour details are anticipated at the time that the Scheduled Tour Brochure was prepared and specific stops and/or other inclusions are subject to change or elimination without notice. This tour typically departs between 7:30 AM and 8 AM with the exact time shown on the itinerary you will receive approximately one to two weeks prior to the tour departure. Tours returns about 5:45 PM to 6:30 PM, although this may vary.

Our next stop will be a visit to the home built by Clara Stone Hay, the widow of John Hay, in 1908. She hired Abram Garfield, the youngest son of President Garfield, to design a home with a courtyard garden and modern conveniences.

This mansion was built in the Italian Renaissance style and was completed in 1911 but she never lived there, choosing to return to New York City. This amazing mansion is furnished with period antiques from various collections as Ms. Hay never furnished it by the time of her departure. In 2017 we have included admissions to the Bob Hope exhibit, too.



Everyone who has lived in this area before September 28, 1969 is sure to remember a true symbol of the fun we used to have, the Euclid Beach Grand Carousel. It took 45 years and a lot of painstaking efforts by many people, but it has been fully restored and we will be enjoying a ride or two as the organ plays those oh-so-familiar songs that we grew up with.
